Sessions

Keynote: Lord Toby Harris of the House of Lords' Science and Technology Committee presents the keynote address, covering his work on the Personal Internet Security Report and the wider security implications of the Web for commercial users.

Data Encryption

Everything that is digital can be copied, and if there is no encryption, your files will be no safer than a set of Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs CDs! This is a session that explores the most modern concepts in encryption, and considers the options available.

Authentication

At the heart of all transactions is the need to be sure that the customers and merchants are dealing with whom the other party claims to be. This session covers the technologies available, and also the human factors that influence take up and use.

The Asymmetrical Law

At a financial institution, every member of the team has a responsibility to ensure that client data is not misused or that the institution does not damage or infect users' systems. However, this relationship is not always equal, with the users having less accountability than the institution, and is often obscured by the lack of international laws. This session considers the legal positions, and makes all those in IT aware of the responsibilities they hold.

Online and Mobile Threats

The internet presents an unprecedented change to the way in which we communicate. It also is a 'Wild West' environment, where users are often naïve and security

ambushes lurk. What can we do to protect ourselves? And how is the technology of both the villains and the good guys changing?

Hacking

Just how can people get behind your security and what can you do to stop them? A practical session on exactly what to do.

Insider Threat

The 'Credit Crunch' has had many side effects, but one is that there is increasing pressure to protect the organisation from disgruntled or fraudulent inside attacks. This session considers how these threats can manifest themselves and what the best practice is to reduce them.

Case Study in Protection

How a major financial services company has made a threat assessment and implemented a comprehensive IT security plan to ensure compliance and safety.

Data Security

Compliance is a requirement, but good practice goes beyond this to create commercial advantage. A 'how to guide' of creating competitive leverage from being secure.

Security as a Cultural Issue

The Global Economy brings with it the issues of dealing with global differences in security culture. A revealing and insightful rundown of two similar but different cultures, the misunderstandings and the lessons that each can learn from the other.

Continuity Management within the UK, Ireland and South Africa. Before joining Cardif Pinnacle in 2005 he was the Head of IT Security and the HR Outsourcing division of Accenture which was his first civilian job after 26 years in the Royal Air Force, serving in a wide variety of roles in the UK and internationally, finally specialising in Counter Intelligence and IT Security.

He is a Fellow of the Institution of Engineering and Technology, a Chartered Engineer and holds CISSP and CISM security certifications. He is currently a freelance specialist in information security and privacy, and has been Chief Security Architect at JPMorgan, and Head of Information Risk Management at Aviva.

David is head of Clifford Chance's Communications, Media and Technology group, with a particular focus on encryption regulation, regulation of e-business services, software licensing and outsourcing. He has over 25 years experience on regulatory issues for the IT industry and its customers, specialising in helping clients with complex, cross border and strategic projects. These projects often require detailed review of cross-border data transfer and information security regulation and requirements. David is also the author of several books and articles on technology and the law.

Jon came to the finance sector from the oil industry, cutting his security teeth at ExxonMobil where he was responsible for eCommerce security for the world's largest company. He then moved to the Tesco group where he secured its 'Clubcard' database - at the time the UK's largest database of personal information. He joined Threadneedle as head of Information Security two years ago where he has integrated an ISO27001 strategy with Threadneedle's award-winning risk management framework, protecting over £70billion of assets as diverse as equities, bonds, hedge funds, commodities and property.

Parliamentary Information Technology Committee

Baron Harris of Haringey is a past president of the Cambridge Union Society, a former leader of Haringey Borough Council, and a Life Peer. He is currently Treasurer of the Parliamentary Information Technology Committee and the Home Secretary's representative on the Metropolitan Police Authority with responsibility for overseeing security. He is a member of the House of Lords Select Committee looking into "Personal Internet Security" and has represented the UK in international internet policy meetings.
